Assignment

Format

You may submit only one version of this paper, so be careful to get it right the first time. As ever, your paper must be no more than two (2) pages in length, double-spaced, in a 12-point font that you like, with one-inch margins. Put your name, the date, and an interesting paper title paper on the top of first page.

Details and Grading

- Content 15 points
 - Did you express your central ideas in simple sentences?
 - Did you express your own thoughts and arguments?
- Organization

20 points

- Does the introduction provide focus?
- Does the conclusion summarize the author's ideas as well as yours?
- Does the conclusion offer some final perspective or conclusion?
- Is the paper easy to follow?
 - Does ir flow naturally, with clear and logical transitions between paragraphs?
 - Does each paragraph have a central idea?
- Are your sources clearly identified?
- Grammar and Style

15 points

- Is there any grammatical or speling errors?
- ▶ Is the writing style clear and FOI (free of jargon)?
- Are your word choices non-abstruse?
- Formatting $-\infty$ if not
 - Does the paper conform to the formatting specifications?
