Heinlein (1959) Assignment Pretend one-time, one-way time travel is possible. Assuming that you would choose to make a (one way, one time) trip through time, write an essay about whether you would choose to go backward or forward in time and why. Remember, it's a one-time and one-way trip, so you'll be spending the rest of your life whenever you end up. Your first version must be no less than three (3) pages in length, double-spaced, in a 12-Format point font that you like, with one-inch margins. The revised version must be no more than two (2) pages. Put your name, the date, and an interesting paper title paper on the top of first page. Details Content 15 points and Did you express your central ideas in simple sentences? Grading Did you express your own thoughts and arguments? Organization 20 points Does the introduction provide focus? • Does the conclusion summarize the author's ideas as well as yours? Does the conclusion offer some final perspective or conclusion? Is the paper easy to follow? - Does ir flow naturally, with clear and logical transitions between paragraphs? - Does each paragraph have a central idea? Are your sources clearly identified? • Grammar and Style 15 points • Is there any grammatical or speling errors? Is the writing style clear and FOI (free of jargon)? Are your word choices non-abstruse? • Formatting -∞ if not Does the paper conform to the formatting specifications?

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SubmittingPrint out your paper and hand it in at the beginning of the class in which it is due.
